## HOW WILL WE USE OUR FREEDOM?

**In 2000, Cornealious Anderson was sentenced to 13 years for robbery. The 23-year-old was released on bail and told to await orders to show up to prison. But due to a clerical error, those orders never came. Some people might have taken advantage of such freedom and committed more crimes. But Anderson started a business, coached youth football and volunteered at church, earning respect in his community.**

**Thirteen years later, when Missouri officials discovered the error and put Anderson behind bars, an online petition called for his release. A judge agreed that Anderson was a changed man and, again, he was freed.**

**What would *you* do with such undeserved freedom? What *do* we do with the unmerited freedom God grants us despite our sin, and with the freedoms we celebrate on July 4? May we follow Anderson's example and use our freedoms — social *and* spiritual — to serve others.**

## Being Okay With the Pencil

It's nice to have answers. I've always loved math, and many times I thought I might like to teach math, because it's such a great feeling . . . having the answers. It's particularly satisfying when you can project into the future, put dates on the calendar and make positive predictions. "We'll have our debt paid off by this date. We'll be graduated by this date. We'll be grandparents by this date."

Our Bible passages this summer are in Genesis 11, and they are about Sarah. She is surrounded by people who - like us, before Covid-19 - can make plans in black ink and get moving. They are productive. They are busy putting their goals into action. But Sarah is like us during this pandemic. She is unable to have children, our Bible says, which is short-hand for something far more essential than that - she is unable to plan, to put anything in motion, to project her ideas into the future with a decent amount of certainty. She must write all of her ideas and answers in pencil, with an eraser nearby. She and Abram are wandering with no end-point, and they are, in some ways, stuck in perpetual state of inertia. They can't get anything off the ground, for sure.

Funny thing, this is our Bible's starting point of faith. Take a pencil and erase the answers on your math test, erase the dates on your calendar,

erase the predictions in your financial planner. . . . that's Sarah's story. Surrounded by multitudes of generations who are churning forward in a predictable rhythm, she is different. She is the person who is forced to be in a state of uncertainty.

Why?

So she can learn about faith.

As we work through the summer, each of us will probably find ourselves planning, re-doing, erasing and starting again. What will school be like? What is happening at college? What about our local businesses? What about our living situation? What about next week? When will I see my grandchildren again? When do I get to be with my friends?

Even as we open our church doors on July 5, we will be a work-in-progress, making decisions about health and safety, shifting gears at times, keeping our eyes aware - perhaps as we have not been before - to the ups and downs of this disease.

A big thank you to those who have continued to keep our church humming along - the session, the office staff, the food pantry workers, the pie ladies. And those who have offered their time, talent and treasure to us with music, words of encouragement, cards and letters, upkeep of the church building and grounds. To those of you who have shared your life's expertise and fumbles in our Bible studies through zoom, a big thank you.

Like Abraham and Sarah, we keep putting one foot in front of the other, loving each other, staying safe and making plans for the coming year . . . . in pencil. We're getting through this! God is with us!

I close with this passage that I keep thinking about. . .

Ephesians 3:20-21

*Now to him who by the power at work within us is able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus to all generations, forever and ever. Amen.*



(SUMMARY; *NOT APPROVED MINUTES*)

## **CHURCH OUTREACH PROJECTS COMMITTEE REPORTS/UPDATES**

- Food at First (Jo) - Jo has been handing out gift certificates to the Cone Shoppe (for food pantry recipients) with money leftover from Food at First donations
- TiLT (Lindsay) - members reported that Lindsay is continuing with Zoom meetings
- Montreat (Dan) - Dan reported that Montreat has officially been cancelled as far as the in-person camp goes. The organization is offering “Montreat at Home” and encourages churches to use videos/film series/handouts in any way the church sees best.

## **SESSION COMMITTEE REPORTS/UPDATE**

- Christian Ed - Camp Wyoming has cancelled all summer programs due to Covid-19; but they are offering “Camp in a Box” items for individuals and families; Christian Ed has offered to pay the fee for anyone who has missed the opportunity to attend camp this year
- Finance/Corporate Trust - Dan presented his reports and is in contact with our bank regarding our CARES loan
- Building - Don reported that the white board sign is now installed on the wall outside of the pastor’s office
- Personnel - Custodian Peggy Green was hired and started cleaning. Jo Zirkelbach, committee chair, requested that Becky Orcutt and Linda Parker be added as members to the Personnel Committee; **MSC**
- Scholarship - have not met due to COVID restrictions; they will meet later in the summer and will keep applicants posted

**REOPENING FOR WORSHIP** - There was a lengthy discussion about this topic, including information about what other churches in town are doing in preparation for reopening. **MSC** to reopen church for:

- Sunday worship beginning July 5, 2020;
- Emory will hold adult Sunday School in Fellowship Hall at 8:30, with church to follow at 10:00. We will come forward for communion but will have offering plates/boxes available at front/back of church. We will not print bulletins, but use the video screens.
- A **separate MSC** was made to send out a mailing to all church members to explain the church’s reopening for services and expectations for attendees.
- We will also stream the service on Facebook, and Emory will continue to do her message on Facebook each week.

You should NOT attend worship if any of the following apply to you:

1. Are sick or have an underlying condition.
2. Work with or care for high risk people.
3. Have been within 6 feet of a person with COVID-19 for at least 5 minutes or had direct contact with their mucus or saliva in the past 14 days.
4. Have had ANY of the following symptoms in the last 48 hours:
  - Fever of 100.5 degrees or higher
  - Fever symptoms like alternating chills and sweating
  - Trouble breathing, shortness of breath, or severe wheezing
  - Loss of smell or taste, or change in taste
  - Muscle aches
  - Cough
  - Diarrhea
  - Sore throat
  - Headache

We are eager to be together as a congregation again, and we are serious about keeping everyone safe. As we begin worshipping under one roof again, we will be making adjustments as we experiment with what is best for our congregation. If you have questions or suggestions, or would like to volunteer to help us to keep our facility germ-free, please contact the church office or any member of the session.
