Patient Attention, Valuable Discoveries

For many people, the coronavirus pandemic has been a test of patience — or worse. Medically vulnerable people face an anxious time of hyper-vigilance. Furloughed workers wait on hold or in lines for assistance. Special events have been canceled or rescheduled.



Those not impacted directly deal with assorted frustrations and inconveniences. Many people

are learning the benefit of slowing down, being present (even virtually) to others and practicing patient attention.

Interestingly, scientist Isaac Newton did some of his best work when the plague forced Cambridge University to close. At home, the inquisitive student invented calculus and developed groundbreaking theories of gravity and optics. Later Newton called 1666 his *annus mirabilis* ("year of wonders") and reportedly said, "If I have made any valuable discoveries, it [owes] more to patient attention than to any other talent."

What have you discovered during the Covid-19 crisis? What appreciations have you developed for aspects of life you may have previously taken for granted? What has social distancing taught you about the value of neighbors, church, community volunteering?

Seeing Wheat

This past Sunday, Bob got up early to make me breakfast. He couldn't sleep because he was on steroids to combat the poison ivy he'd gotten on his face while weed-whacking the yard. While I was gobbling down the fried eggs, sausage and toast, I said, "So do you have any thoughts about Jesus' parable of the wheat and tares?"

The parable goes that a farmer plants some nice wheat, but during the night, while everyone is sleeping, an enemy comes and plants a weed throughout the farm - a weed that looks a lot like wheat. "Should we get rid of it?" The farm hands say, when they realize what has happened. The farmer says, "No. If you do that, you'll destroy the wheat. Just let them grow together, then when it is harvest time, you will be able to see clearly which stems are wheat and which are tares, or weeds.

Bob said, "The coronavirus has made it hard to see the wheat at all. I think it's all about looking for the wheat."

So if the kingdom of heaven is like wheat, meaning it is hard to recognize, what examples do we have of that? Where is God's kingdom breaking into this world of the pandemic? I have a few examples from my own life.

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Tonight, I'm planning to have a zoom meeting with some church members, and we are playing Trivial Pursuit.

I wouldn't normally be zooming with anyone, and I can't remember the last time I played a board game with church members. Last night, way past my bedtime, I was lying on a blanket in a baseball field looking for the comet in the sky, and yes, I was with some church members. We had our face masks on, pointing out the Big Dipper, laughing at fireflies. Last Sunday, we had our Bible study under the tree in the side yard of the church. Then, we had church there. The UCC/ Methodist folks were having their worship across the street, and it was so lovely, hearing our voices blending with theirs. I can add a graduation party, some phone calls, some cards, and some conversations around a campfire, some more zoom counseling visits and a few hellos in the grocery store.

"We have to keep looking for the wheat," Bob said. This was Jesus' call to his disciples and friends. Yes, we deal with cruelties around us, and we can become disheartened. But the beautiful experiences are right here, and we can see God's hand in our world, even with our facemarks on.

(Summary; NOT Approved Minutes)

2020 July 8

Moderator, Pastor Emory Gillespie, called the meeting to order at 6:05 p.m., on Wednesday, July 8, 2020, and led the Session with a prayer.

Clerk reported one building use request for July 19th (Fellowship Hall) by Don Smith; one wedding has taken place on June 27th (congratulations to Alexa (Masse) and Mike Corbin); attendance at our first service back in the sanctuary (July 5th) was 19; the Presbytery Meeting scheduled for July 11th is now a ZOOM meeting.

The Pastor's report included that she has been busy with video sermons, ZOOM adult Sunday School class, and worship back in the sanctuary. Emory requested 2 weeks of vacation leave: July 27-August 9; she will miss 2 Sundays, Aug. 2 and Aug. 9. **Motion was made, seconded and carried,** to approve this leave. Larry Lamont will preach on August 2nd. Emory will check with either Ed or Jean from United Church to see if either of them is interested in Aug. 9; if not, she will check with the Presbytery.

Dan Saunders reported that we will receive our \$1,000 deposit returned from Montreat due to the cancellation of the program this summer. **Motion was made, seconded and carried**, for Dan to deposit this money back into the general fund.

Vickie Bone spoke on behalf of the Scholarship Committee. The Committee was in the difficult position of having eight qualified candidates (all church members) for the five Dale L. Streif \$1,000 scholarships. **Motion was made, seconded and carried, that for 2020 only**, we will award all eight applicants a \$1,000 scholarship.

Motion was made, seconded and carried, for Dan Saunders to gather quotes for a new office copy machine.

The Session members discussed ways of reaching out to our members during this difficult time. We will further discuss this topic at the August 12th meeting.
