Various versions of the following sentiment are posted online: "I am a human being, not a human doing. It's okay to just *be* sometimes." Many of us get anxious if we think we're not *doing* enough, but peace activist Thich Nhat Hanh insists it's not a waste of time to just be: "To be alive, to be peaceful, to be joyful, to be loving ... is what the world needs most."

During the pandemic, when people were urged to stay home to slow the virus' spread, we had to think hard about how to continue being the church while limited in what we could go out and "do." Yet church leaders reminded us that we were actually loving our neighbors by staying home — by being less active.

It's sometimes okay — ideal, even — to just be. In quieting our bodies, minds and hearts, we may find ourselves more often in prayer, more aware of God's presence and more nourished for when the time is right to again take up more active forms of

In The Wilderness

Our scripture readings right now have us in the wilderness with our ancient sisters and brothers who are doing a lot of grumbling. The Hebrew word 'grumbling' is connected

to the word 'lodge,' like when a piece of food is 'lodged' in your throat. Or you are stuck at home. It means that 'grumbling' happens when we feel stuck. Grumbling happens when we are quarantined and isolated from the world. I'm surprised often when our ancient stories in the Bible are so similar to the experiences we are having right now!

Because - many of us feel stuck right now, and we feel grumbly in our stomachs. Our lives have narrowed. Many of us are stuck in a tight hallway, trying to untangle some technology cords, trying to stay connected to our world, trying to keep our kids on task in school, trying to organize the muted chaos. And it's an election year, so all of our choices, all of our dreams, values and hopes for the world are reduced to two candidates, primarily, on local and national levels. It is a time of great pressure when we are locked down emotionally, intellectually and physically.

So I love the story of water from the rock. In Exodus, the people are crying out, and God hears them. They are thirsty. And so are we. We feel the unforgiving boulders of Covid pressing in on our minds, and deep down, we are thirsty. Thirsty for fun, festivals, togetherness, high-fives in the school hallways, big hugs at church and friendly people holding our hands. We are thirsty for human touch.

In our story, God 'touches' the people with flowing, cool water. Out of a rock, God brings refreshment. The people are restored.

Even as we continue to bear the weight of Covid, as numbers rise and fall and rise again, God brings us cool water to refresh our souls. This fall, even when our options seem to narrow, may all of us experience the fullness of God's goodness and mercy, the abundance of God's love and the ever-flowing stream of justice in our lives and the lives of those around us.

Ravi Zacharias, who recently died at 74, was a religious skeptic until age 17, after a suicide attempt landed him in the hospital. A visitor brought a Bible to Zacharias, who eventually became a vigorous defender of the faith.

When asked about his work, he told the Christian Post, "Truth must always be undergirded by love. My [parents] used to say, 'If you cut off someone's nose,

there is no use in giving him a rose to smell.' If Christian apologetics cuts off the listener's nose, there is no use in giving them the sweet aroma of the Christian message. You have to do it undergirded by love. You learn this as a parent. You can hammer something into your child's head, and when they leave they extract it and fling it away. But if you sow it with seeds of love, it will remain in their hearts permanently. So the truth of Christ is both true and relevant undergirded by love."


Families of College Students:
