phone calls and cards. We've learned to recognize each other with masks on! And many of us are learning how to give in new ways, too! So let me explain some forms of giving.



Session Meeting Summary - December

The Session met for their regular monthly meeting on Wednesday, Dec. 9, 2020. Jo Zirkelbach presented information on behalf of the Personnel Committee regarding their annual reviews with our staff. Mackenzie's salary will remain the same and Emory's financial package will be reviewed by the congregation at the annual meeting in January. Emory wishes to decline a raise this year. The Committee also recommended an annual bonus in the amount of \$100 each to the following staff members: April Keltner, Peggy Green, Dan Saunders, and Mackenzie Kahler; MSC.

Finance/Corporate Trust - Dan Saunders presented the 2021 budget and monthly financial report which will be reviewed by the congregation at the annual meeting. Discussion centered around the good news that all bills are paid at present time and CARES Act loan was forgiven; however our income (giving) is not keeping up with expenses. Per capita for 2021 is \$38.03, an increase of \$.03.

The Nominating Committee is finishing up with the slate of officers for 2021. Emory will be on vacation 12/26 through 1/1/21; she requested to extend her vacation an extra day through Sunday, January 3, 2021; **MSC** with pulpit supply for that day to be decided (Emory is working on filling pulpit for 12/27).

The meeting concluded at 7:50 p.m. with the Session singing-quietly-one verse of "O Come All Ye Faithful".
