
### LIBERTY THROUGH SURRENDER

To non-believers, talk of finding freedom through complete dependence on Jesus must sound foolish. How can surrendering your desires, time, heart — indeed, your entire life — lead to anything but bondage?

The answer is evident in Jesus' own life and ministry, writes Michael Card in Immanuel:

Reflections on the Life of Christ. In a twist on Julius Caesar's motto "Veni, vidi, vici" ("I came, I saw, I conquered"), "Jesus lived by the motto, 'I came, I saw, I surrendered," Card notes. "By living out this unorthodox pronouncement, Jesus demonstrated that what the world regards as power is really impotence. True victory is only through surrender."

During the 16<sup>th</sup> century, St. Ignatius of Loyola wrote this prayer of surrender that's still relevant today: "Take, O Lord, and receive my entire liberty, my memory, my understanding and my whole will. All that I am and all that I possess, Thou hast given me: I surrender it all to Thee to be disposed of according to Thy will. Give me only Thy love and Thy grace; with these I will be rich enough and will desire nothing more. Amen."



## PASTOR'S PONDERINGS

In July, the Session will discuss the final lesson in the Ruling Elders Workbook. It is titled "Transformational Leaders Commit to Self-Awareness." What is involved in this commitment to self-awareness?

"Self-awareness requires knowing our strengths but also knowing our limitations. It means having confidence that comes from reliance on God. Self-aware leaders connect with others while maintaining appropriate boundaries. Self-aware elders are able to lead well because they know themselves as fallible human beings called and led by God."

The call of God is a life-long journey of spiritual and personal growth. It involves an authentic faith in God and a desire to follow Christ as our leader, model, teacher, mentor and savior. This desire raises two important questions for leaders who are self-aware:

- 1. What is your greatest desire for yourself as a ruling elder?
- 2. What is your greatest desire for the congregation you lead?

We do not answer these questions on the basis of our own egos. Rather, we are at our best when our desires align with God's. This requires that we distinguish between the little voice of our own egos and the voice of Christ. Transformational leaders put their own egos aside for the sake of Christ and his church.

In sum, to be self-aware is to be mindful of self as a fallible human being with limitations, but also mindful of self as a confident servant leader whose desire is to follow Christ. Such self-awareness gives us the courage to cross boundaries that are uncomfortable or challenging, and to maintain boundaries that keep us healthy, authentic, and grounded. Elders who commit to self-awareness are used by God to lead the church into the future.

#### SESSION HIGHLIGHTS - JUNE 8, 2022

Discussed chapter 5 in the Ruling Elders Workbook: "Transformational Leaders Practice and Promote Spiritual Disciplines."

The Pentecost Offering was \$200. Forty per cent (\$80) was retained to be used for supporting children and youth in our community.

The Building Committee is inspecting some light fixtures in the sanctuary. Window screens in the Sunday School wing that were not replaced last year will be replaced.

Agreed to put together a team of volunteers to come up with ideas for arranging and updating the pastor's office space. This includes location, furnishings and décor.

Christian Education Committee members are responding to a letter from Lisa Keltner our youth Sunday School Superintendent. Letter is compiled info and suggestions from the Sunday School teachers. Session is grateful for her leadership.

Thanked the Nominating Committee for its work on the PNC. Jim Anderson gave the report on June 5: Suzy Gilkerson (chair), Roger Benedict, Carrie Fellinger, Aaron Orcutt, Alexis Corbin.

Continued work on a "Policy Book." Received suggested updates on the Kitchen Policy from the Pie Ladies, to be discussed at the next meeting. Approved a Child and Youth Protection Policy, a Sexual Harassment Policy, and an Equal Opportunity Employment Policy. Emended the Building Use Policy to clarify when session approval is required.

Approved pastoral search expenses for the PNC in the amount of \$1,500, with an openness to a future request for more if needed. Also approved a "Pastor Job Description" to be used by the PNC.

Will seek to hire a half-time pastor supply until a pastor is called. This person would preach every Sunday and be present two days a week, one of which would be Wednesday in order to teach the confirmation class. Pastor Randy's last Sunday as the full-time intentional interim is July 31.
