# **SPRING TRAINING FOR CHRISTIANS**

Gethsemane, the name of the place where Jesus prayed before his betrayal, is an Aramaic word for "olive press." During Bible times, olives were pressed three times to remove all the valuable oil. Before being arrested in the Garden of Gethsemane, Jesus felt the full pressing weight of our sins on his shoulders. Surrounded by olive trees, praying fervently while sweating drops of blood, the perfect Son of God asked his heavenly Father three times to remove the cup of suffering.



Instead of removing that trial, God used it to redeem and save humankind. Likewise, God uses our hardships to refine and strengthen our faith.

In *The Rock, the Road and the Rabbi*, TV host Kathie Lee Gifford and Messianic Rabbi Jason Sobel speculate that if Peter, along with James and John, hadn't fallen asleep in Gethsemane, he may have had the strength to not deny Jesus later that night.

"All of us must be vigilant to watch and pray so that we don't succumb to the temptation to deny the Lord when we go through the olive presses of life and feel like we are being crushed by our situation and circumstances," the authors write. "We must remember that it is the crushing that brings out the true inner value and worth of the olive."

## Invaluable!

"The kingdom of heaven," said Jesus, "is like a merchant in search of fine pearls; on finding one pearl of great value, he went and sold all that he had and bought it" (Matthew 13:45-46, NRSV).

In 2021, the Good News Network reported that a crab fisherman in Thailand stumbled upon a valuable Melo pearl while cutting up a snail for lunch. In wonder, he brought it to his brother to verify the discovery. "My family had been fishing for generations," said Prasarnphon Phunwan, "but I believe our fate is about to change because of my lunch." Several months prior, another fisherman had been offered \$351,000 for a similar pearl.

Likewise, God's priceless love immeasurably alters our eternal fate. If we fully comprehended the value of that love, we'd give up everything to obtain it. But the greater wonder is that we don't have to buy it. God gives it to us as a gift! Whether we seemed to encounter Jesus by chance or someone joyfully shared the Gospel with us, our Savior is the merchant who "sold all that he had" — even his life. So priceless is salvation! So valuable are we!



'Now the word of the Lord came to Jonah, son of Amittai, saying, "Go at once to Nineveh, that great city, and cry out against it: for their wickedness has come up before me." But Jonah set out to flee to Tarshish from the presence of the Lord.' Jonah 1:1-3

We love the story of Jonah. There are so many memorable images to capture our imagination. There is Jonah, the reluctant evangelist. There is the crew on the boat he sails, who do everything they can to save Jonah before throwing him overboard. There is the great fish that

swallows Jonah and the solemn prayer that Jonah makes before the fish 'spews' Jonah up onto dry ground.

I have been asking us to think about 'What does the voice of God sound like? And, How do we know when God is speaking to us, calling us to some place or tasks?' Is God's voice an audible voice that wakens a Samuel from his slumber (1Sam 3) or more like the whisper that Elijah hears (1Kings 19). Why does any of this matter?

We have said our mission is 'to make known the love of God through Jesus Christ' and our vision is 'to be people who are empowered to live out our faith in daily life'; don't we need to hear God telling us, showing us, how to make this love known.

It is easy, I think, in this world so cluttered with the noise of competing voices, to lose a sense that God is speaking to us, but God still is speaking in ways that are obvious and ways that are subtle. God is still calling us to big things and small. Doesn't God speak to us asking us to comfort a grieving friend, or to help and neighbor in need? Doesn't God speak to us through the encouragement of others or the challenges of particular situations? Doesn't God speak to us in the hungry in need of a little food, the one in need of shelter through no fault of their own, and the lonely who need company? Doesn't God remind us of what goodness looks like and feels like in the dawning of a new morning, in the joy of being with others, and the satisfaction of helping others?

To be people who are empowered to live out faith in our daily life, we need to hear and see God at work around us so we know what it is that we should do. What is God saying to you?



# Thanks for helping out! Funerals

It takes all of us pitching in to make the church not only work, but work in the way it was intended.

"Each person is given something to do that shows who God is: Everyone gets in on it, everyone benefits. All kinds of things are handed out by the Spirit, and to all kinds of people!" -1Cor 12:7 The Message

But there is also the funeral luncheon. In my mind, the luncheon is the place where many people experience comfort and support. At the funeral luncheon, the quiet and more somber notes of the funeral service give way to the noise of stories and laughter being shared.

It takes a lot of folks to host a funeral luncheon. Sides, salads, and deserts are needed, as well as helpers to provide a warm welcome, set up the meal, help people with trays, and clean up afterwards.

To help with funeral luncheons, your schedule has to be a little flexible because we never know exactly when they will come up. The commitment can be providing a dish or desert or working the luncheon. The commitment for those working the luncheon can vary by the time they have available to help. Some come to help get ready, some come to help clean up, and many help for the whole thing which can be a four-hour or more commitment.

#### Per Capita 2024 is \$42.17 Per Member

WHAT IS PER CAPITA **Per Capita** is the primary source of funding for the Presbytery, as well as the Synod and General Assembly, and is **how Presbyterians mutually and equitably share the costs** of coming together to perceive the Spirit's leading for the future.

Paying per capita is similar to: • contributing one's dish to a potluck meal • paying to be connected to the internet • paying for the benefit of utilities, such as electricity, gas, water • pitching in with others to pay for gasoline on a road trip.

WHERE DO LOCAL PER CAPITA DOLLARS GO? The per capita apportionment in the Presbytery of East Iowa is based on the operating expenses of the Presbytery. This would include administration expenses and some salaries, detailed in each annual budget approved by the Presbytery, including managing Presbytery office and expenses, salaries to cover the office of the Presbyter and Stated Clerk, salaries of the Financial Secretary and Office Manager, insurance coverage, legal counsel, annual audit, and costs for committees.

At the time of newsletter print, 8.5% (\$506.04) of our congregations per capita has been received. (\$42.17/member x 144 active members = \$6,072)


