The rains will come. Whether you're experiencing light rain or a downpour, ponder what the water reveals. Then ask God how you can be more open to his work in that area.

What I Learned in Confirmation



This year's confirmation class concluded on Palm Sunday when Carter Willms was confirmed. All six confirmands (Carter Willms, Cameron Pasker, Dalton and Drew Ricklefs, Jackson Saunders, and Noah West) took part writing prayers for, and leading that service. I am really proud of these young men. They let their faith challenge them by doing something that they weren't completely sure about or comfortable with. I believe that their faith grew through this experience. I know my faith grew.

With spring comes new life. Bulbs planted in the fall or many years ago will start to push out of the ground. Tender buds will adorn tree branches with the promise of leaves that will later shade us. The grass will green and flowers will bloom. Growth will happen all around us.

But what about in us. What are the things that need to grow? What are the risks that we need to take in order to grow?

These confirmands have shown up week after week. They listened, they participated in the different studies, and asked questions. Sometimes they were bored to tears (I think) and sometimes they were silly...but most of all they were thinking... thinking about their own lives and their own faith. A lot of times I couldn't see anything happening inside them but then all of a sudden there it was, six serious young men leading this congregation in worship.

In some ways, as I have watched them, I have been thinking about how it is time for my own faith to grow, in some small or large way. I don't know what this looks like yet but I am beginning to listen more closely, read more diligently, pray more simply, and think more deeply about what it means to be a disciple of Jesus Christ. When the time comes for me to take a risk, I will be encouraged by this confirmation class and the risk they took in leading worship on Palm Sunday. (Maybe I will take a risk and sing during the sermon some time. Probably not! If you're wondering what that is about, ask one of the confirmands.)





It is an opportunity to learn something new, to continue conversations begun by keynote speakers with others over meals or a board game, to share talents of creativity and music, to worship without being in charge, to be energized for service, and to enjoy not having to cook for a week.

Each month I have been trying to remind us of how the church in general, and this church specifically, needs every one pitching in and contributing, to make 'church' work. I have talked about things like helping out in worship, or serving as an elder or deacon, or offering hospitality, or taking time to clean up those things that need attention. This month I want to talk about our financial giving.

One of the most important ways that we contribute to the whole is through our financial giving and generosity. It takes all of us, each doing our part, to provide for the financial well being of the church.

The church's budget expenses this year are just over \$207,000. Our anticipated income is budgeted at just over \$168,500. Of this budgeted income amount we anticipate about \$100,000 of giving (weekly offerings and per capita gifts) and \$68,000 through what I would call generosity (the endowments, scholarship funds, Pie Committee contributions, special offerings, and fund raising).

Our budget is not extravagant. There is not a lot for spending on others (Mission). It basically pays the pastor and employees, keeps the building heated and cooled, and covers the insurance. (These items make up approximately 82% of our budget.)

Our giving is like a lot of things we do as the church, some of us are able to give more and some of us able to give less, but when we are all doing what we can it makes the church work the way that God intended it to.
