PASTOR'S Ponderings

In September, we are going to start using what is known as the Narrative Lectionary to guide the scripture readings that are shared in worship. The Narrative Lectionary was developed in 2010 by two professors at Luther Seminary.

The intention of the Narrative Lectionary is to help people hear the salvation story from creation to the new church by reading across the breadth of the Bible over the course of each year. (It is a four-year cycle.) The Narrative Lectionary focuses more on telling a comprehensive story (Old Testament to New Testament), where the Revised Common Lectionary often is more topical.

Here is a brief overview of the Narrative Lectionary's approach.

- September-mid-December: Readings begin with Creation and move through the history of Israel, covering the Patriarchs, Exodus, Kings, Prophets, Exile, and Return.
- Christmas–Easter: The lectionary focuses on a sustained, sequential reading of one of the four Gospels each year within a four-year cycle.
- Easter-Pentecost: Readings are selected from the book of Acts and the letters of Paul.

I think it is going to be a good way for us to hear scripture in new ways, and my hope is that it will nurture our faith and life so that we will be equipped for the living of our Christian faith.

If you can't be in church or join us on FaceBook live stream, you can follow along by reading the passages of the Narrative Lectionary assigned for each week.

FPC values children in worship, but also recognizes the developmental challenges for children in our worship format.

The nursery is a place where children are welcomed as they learn how to be with others in worship. At the same time the nursery is a place to offer parents/ care givers respite so that they can engage in worship more fully.

When children begin second grade, FPC encourages children to remain throughout worship so they can learn about worship through their parents and the congregation and be a part of worship. The nursery will be available if a child or parent just needs an occasional break from time to time. The nursery remains available to those children that have special developmental needs. FPC will provide books and quiet activities located at the entry to help children with this transition.

The nursery is covered by our Child and Youth Protection Policy that includes background checking of those working with our children and youth and the two-adult rule. This policy is available in full by contacting the church office.

We encourage those members 18 years or older to take part in serving in the nursery ministry.

Building Projects - Sanctuary Windows Update

The work on the sanctuary windows began in July and continued through August. As the craftspeople from Glass Heritage got into the work on the large windows on the west side of the sanctuary, they discovered more damage to the wood framing than they expected and found that the leading that connects the pieces of glass in the lower 2/3rds of the windows would need to be refurbished. In August, Session approved a change order to address the issues with the framing and approved Glass Heritage's proposal for the restoration of those panels needing work. The cost for this additional work is \$26,643, including taxes. The cost will exceed the contingency moneys that had been budgeted for the projects. Session will be discussing how to cover these additional cost in the months to come.

Glass Heritage will be removing those glass panels in the next month or so and taking them to their shop in the Quad Cities. The plan will be to start restoration in November or December and for the windows to be replaced in January or February of 2026. The congregation is invited to visit Glass Heritage's renovation shop during the restoration.

One of the jobs we have is that of **greeter**. The greeter arrives 15-20 minutes before Sunday worship to greet people, 'Good morning! How are you?' Give them a bulletin, and let them know about things like following worship on the screens or where the bathroom or nursery is (if they are visiting). The greeter closes the doors to the sanctuary at the beginning of worship.

After worship, the greeter opens the doors to sanctuary during the last hymn. As people are leaving, the greeter checks the pews, puts any hymnals or Bibles back in the pew racks, tears out the signed attendances sheets and gives them to Dan Saunders.

This job is filled one Sunday at a time so this commitment is just for the date you sign up on. It can be one person or a group of folks. There are always people around to help if you have questions. 
